

U.S. Government: Ambassador Special Self-Help Fund: Promoting Healthy Communities through Community-Led Sanitation, Biosand Filtration, and Behavior Change Initiative Peje Baoma Kaolahun District

Chatham House: Royal Institute of International Affairs Sustainability Accelerator Microgrant: Ecrobrick Tranforming Plastic Waste to Sustainable Pavement Bricks

We have made incredible strides at the Ecobrick Research Assistants Training, funded by the Chatham House Sustainability Accelerator! Participants engaged in hands-on activities to develop and test sustainable solutions for transforming plastic waste into resilient pavement bricks.

Using innovative materials like seaweed, sawdust, rice husk, clay, and sand, we explored models that prioritize eco-friendly production, reduce harmful emissions, and minimize microplastic pollution. These efforts are critical as we work toward a cleaner, greener future for all.

In partnership with The READS, Njala University Volunteers (NUV), Sierra Leone Debating Council (SLDC), Independent Students Movement (ISM), and SUG-NUNC Ministry of Environment and Education, we're taking a bold step to refine these models, turning ideas into action.

We encourage everyone to join this movement—reduce single-use plastics, educate your communities, and take part in creating innovative solutions. Together, we can make a significant impact!

Sierra Leone Sustainable Harvest Project focused on Agribusiness initiatives, introducing a brand-new concept to our local farmers, which they embraced enthusiastically. While many of them have experience in farming, they had limited knowledge of how to generate profit from their crops. As a result, much of their harvest is either sold at low prices or goes to waste. Most of the farmers end up empowering middlemen, who buy their produce cheaply and resell it at a higher price during times of scarcity. This cycle has kept them in poverty, a point highlighted by one farmer who expressed this realization after learning about Agribusiness.

Over 60 young leaders, activists, and changemakers came together for the Sierra Leone Youth Climate Adaptation Dialogue, as part of the global Youth Climate Adaptation Action Day organized by Youth Initiative 4 Climate Action in partnership with the Global Center on Adaptation, Green Africa Youth Organization, and Plan International Sierra Leone. But Freetown was just one piece of the puzzle—similar events were happening in over 300 locations across 70 countries, all united by one mission: to drive youth-led solutions for climate adaptation.
